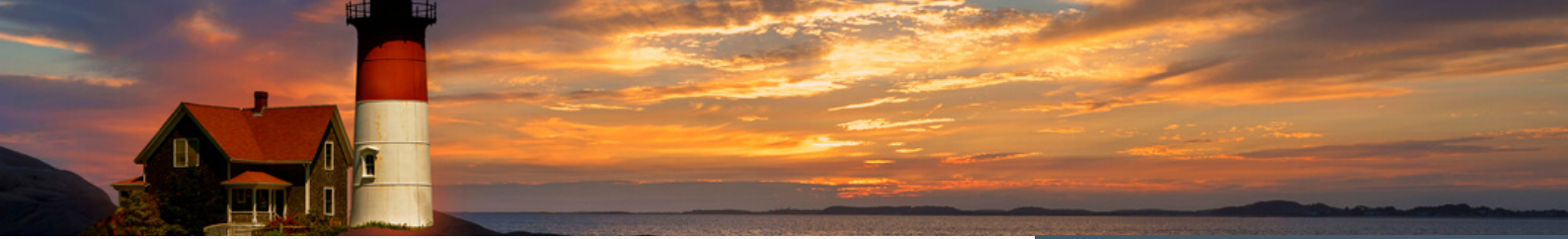

### MATTHEW 24:4-15

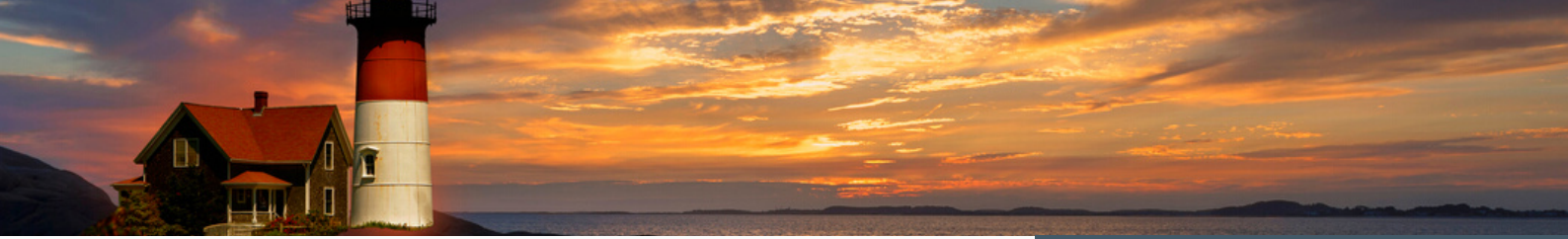

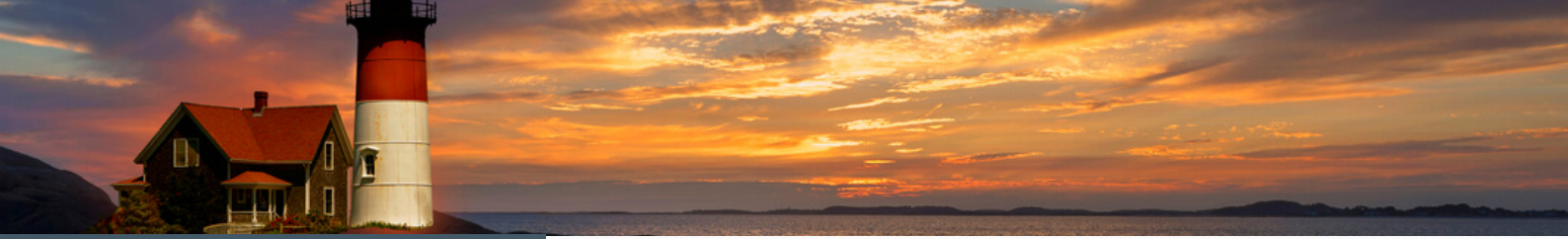
And I heard another voice from heaven saying, "Come out of her My people, so that you will not participate in her sins and receive of her plagues;"

Reflecting Christ Devotional. December 24, God's People Protected

When Christ ceases His intercession in the sanctuary, the unmingled wrath threatened against those who worship the beast and his image and receive his mark (Revelation 14:9, 10) will be poured out. The plagues upon Egypt when God was about to deliver Israel were similar in character to those more terrible and extensive judgments which are to fall upon the world just before the final deliverance of God's people...

These plagues are not universal, or the inhabitants of the earth would be wholly cut off. Yet they will be the most awful scourges that have ever been known to mortals. All the judgments upon men, prior to the close of probation, have been mingled with mercy. The pleading blood of Christ has shielded the sinner from receiving the full measure of his guilt; but in the final judgment, wrath is poured out unmixed with mercy...

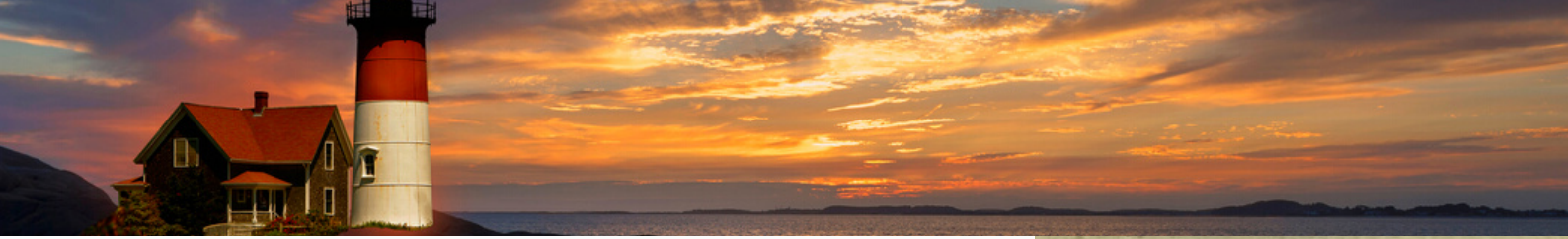
The people of God will not be free from suffering; but while persecuted and distressed, while they endure privation and suffer for want of food, they will not be left to perish. That God who cared for Elijah will not pass by one of His self-sacrificing children. He who numbers the hairs of their head will care for them, and in time of famine they shall be satisfied. While the wicked are dying from hunger and pestilence, angels will shield the righteous and supply their wants. To him that "walketh righteously" is the promise; "Bread shall be given him; his waters shall be sure" (Isaiah 33:15, 16). "When the poor and needy seek water, and there is none, and their tongue faileth for thirst, I the Lord will hear them, I the God of Israel will not forsake them" (chap. 41:17).

"Although the fig tree shall not blossom, neither shall fruit be in the vines," ... yet shall they that fear Him "rejoice in the Lord" and joy in the God of their salvation (Habakkuk 3:17, 18)...

## Daniel T. Bourdeau

### ADVENTIST PIONEER SPOTLIGHT

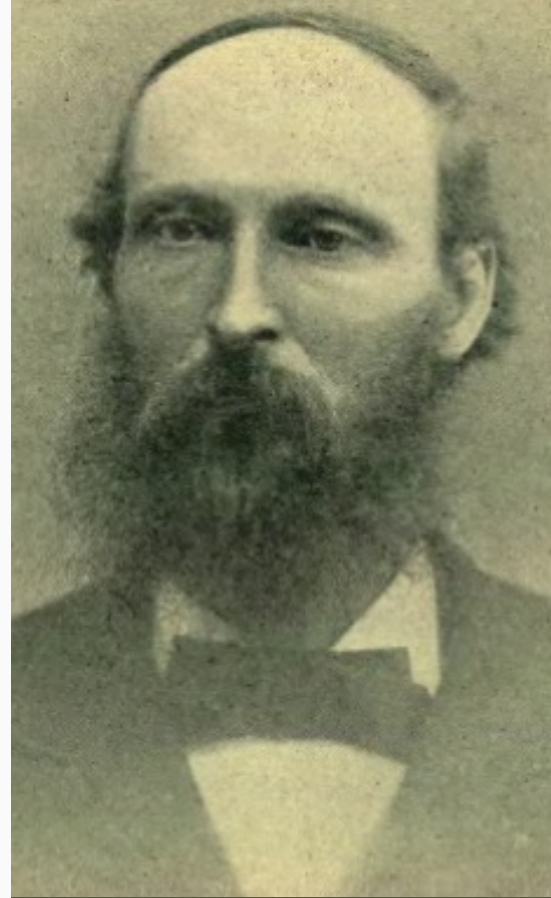
(December 28, 1835 – June 30, 1905)

Daniel T. Bourdeau was an evangelist and missionary, and brother of Augustin Cornelius Bourdeau. At 11 years of age he was baptized into the Baptist Church and at 16, with his brother, attended a Baptist French-language institution at Grand Ligne, Lower Canada.

In 1855, Daniel, at the age of 20, was teaching in some of the eastern townships of Lower Canada and doing missionary work when he heard news that his parents and brother had accepted the teachings of and joined the membership of a small, strange ex-Millerite "offshoot". Daniel was distressed, believing that his family had been badly misled and deceived. He determined to rescue these "deluded" loved ones from this deception. In the course of his research, he had a conversation with a Roman Catholic priest who startled Daniel by siding with the Bourdeau family, agreeing that the Church of Rome had, indeed, changed the observance of the Seventh-day Saturday to Sunday. And the priest went on to affirm stoutly that the Pope had both the authority and power to do it!

Daniel now realized that he would have to examine this question most carefully. Letters from the family, giving reasons for their new-found faith, presented a beautiful chain of truth. Daniel shortly thereafter accepted the Three Angels' Messages of Revelation 14 as his own personal credo. 1858, he was ordained to the Seventh-day Adventist ministry and spent many years in evangelism in New England and Canada. As far as is known, the two brothers were the first of French descent to have accepted the SDA faith.

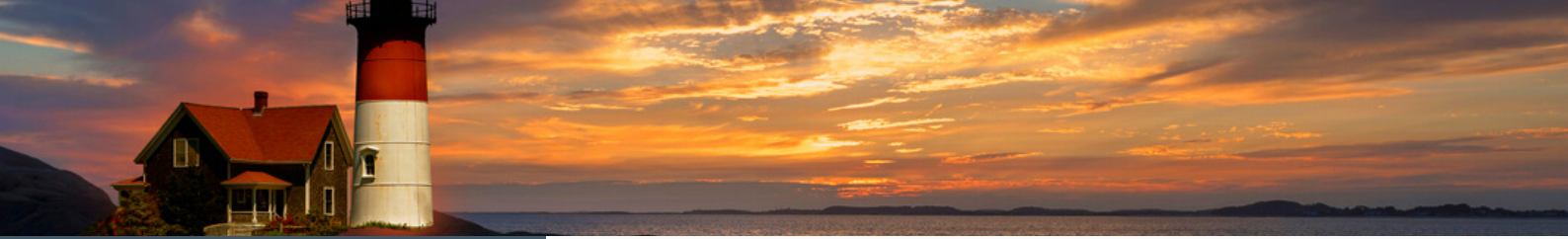
In 1861 he married Marion E. Saxby. In 1868, he responded to a call from an SDA group in California, headed by M. G. Kellogg, to open SDA work in that state. When he returned to the East in 1870 he resumed work among the French-speaking people and organized churches in Wisconsin and Illinois. Altogether he spent seven years overseas. On returning to America (1888), he continued as a minister and writer.

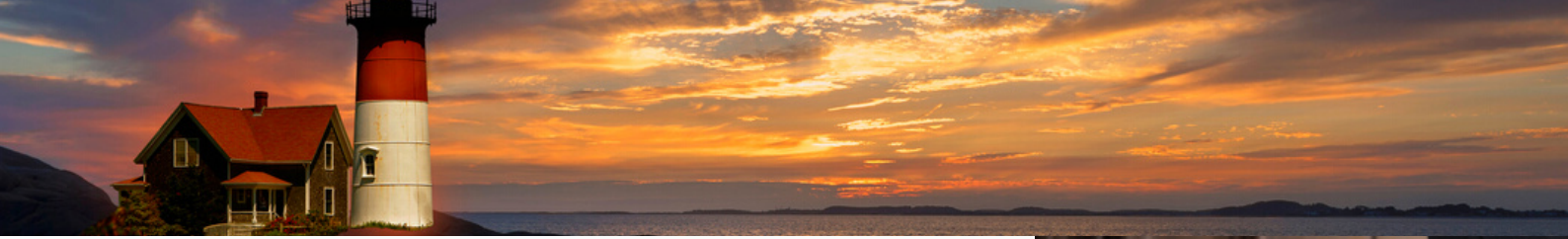

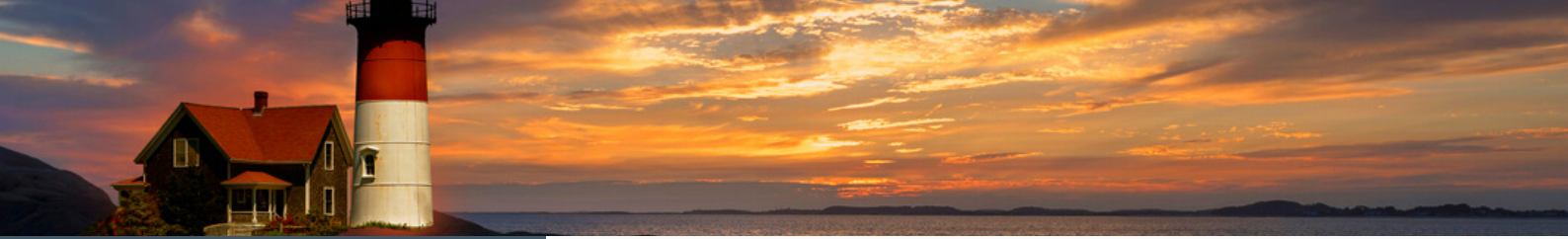

## The Ministry of Health and Healing

### CHAPTER 21: HYGIENE AMONG THE ISRAELITES

In the teaching that God gave to Israel, the preservation of health received careful attention. The people who had come from slavery with the uncleanly and unhealthful habits which it engenders, were subjected to the strictest training in the wilderness before entering Canaan. Health principles were taught and sanitary laws enforced.

#### Prevention of Disease

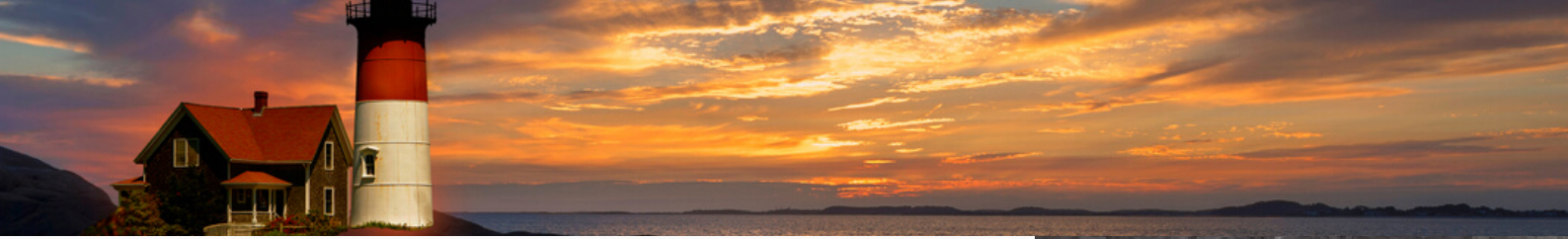
Not only in their religious service, but in all the affairs of daily life was observed the distinction between clean and unclean. All who came in contact with contagious or contaminating diseases were isolated from the encampment, and they were not permitted to return without thorough cleansing of both the person and the clothing. In the case of one afflicted with a contaminating disease, the direction was given:

"Every bed, whereon he lieth, . . . is unclean: and everything, whereon he sitteth, shall be unclean. And whosoever toucheth his bed shall wash his clothes, and bathe himself in water, and be unclean until the even. And he that sitteth on anything whereon he sat . . . shall wash his clothes, and bathe himself in water, and be unclean until the even. And he that toucheth the flesh of him . . . shall wash his clothes, [278] and bathe himself in water, and be unclean until the even. . . . And whosoever toucheth anything that was under him shall be unclean until the even: and he that beareth any of those things shall wash his clothes, and bathe himself in water, and be unclean until the even. And whomsoever he toucheth . . . and hath not rinsed his hands in water, he shall wash his clothes, and bathe himself in water, and be unclean until the even. And the vessel of earth, that he toucheth, . . . shall be broken: and every vessel of wood shall be rinsed in water." Leviticus 15:4-12.

The law concerning leprosy is also an illustration of the thoroughness with which these regulations were to be enforced:

"All the days wherein the plague shall be in him [the leper] he shall be defiled; he is unclean: he shall dwell alone; without the camp shall his habitation be. The garment also that the plague of leprosy is in, whether it be a woolen garment, or a linen garment;

whether it be in the warp, or woof; of linen, or of woollen; whether in a skin, or in anything made of skin; . . . the priest shall look upon the plague: . . . if the plague be spread in the garment, either in the warp, or in the woof, or in a skin, or in any work that is made of skin; the plague is a fretting leprosy; it is unclean. He shall therefore burn that garment, whether warp or woof, in woollen or in linen, or anything of skin, wherein the plague is: for it is a fretting leprosy; it shall be burnt in the fire." Leviticus 13:46-52.

So, too, if a house gave evidence of conditions that rendered it unsafe for habitation, it was destroyed. The priest was to "break down the house, the stones of it, and the timber thereof, and all the mortar of the house; and he shall carry them forth out of the city into an unclean place. Moreover [279] he that goeth into the house all the while that it is shut up shall be unclean until the even. And he that lieth in the house shall wash his clothes; and he that eateth in the house shall wash his clothes." Leviticus 14:45-47.

### Cleanliness

The necessity of personal cleanliness was taught in the most impressive manner. Before gathering at Mount Sinai to listen to the proclamation of the law by the voice of God, the people were required to wash both their persons and their clothing. This direction was enforced on pain of death. No impurity was to be tolerated in the presence of God.

During the sojourn in the wilderness the Israelites were almost continually in the open air, where impurities would have a less harmful effect than upon the dwellers in close houses. But the strictest regard to cleanliness was required both within and without their tents. No refuse was allowed to remain within or about the encampment. The Lord said: [280]

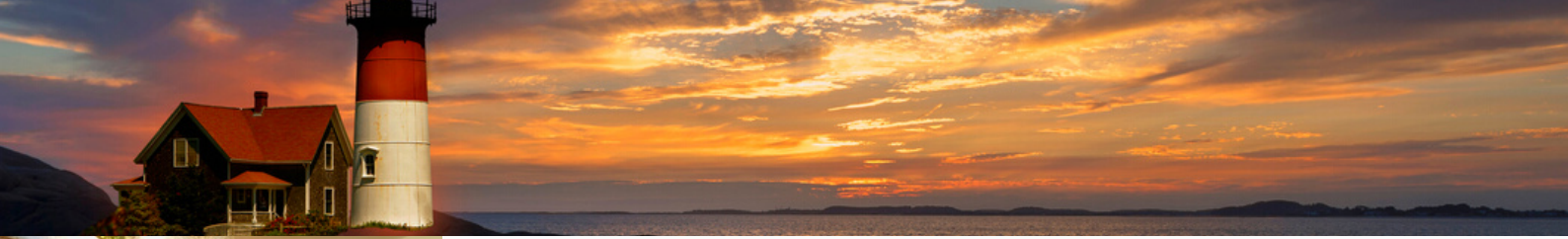
"The Lord thy God walketh in the midst of thy camp, to deliver thee, and to give up thine enemies before thee; therefore shall thy camp be holy." Deuteronomy 23:14.

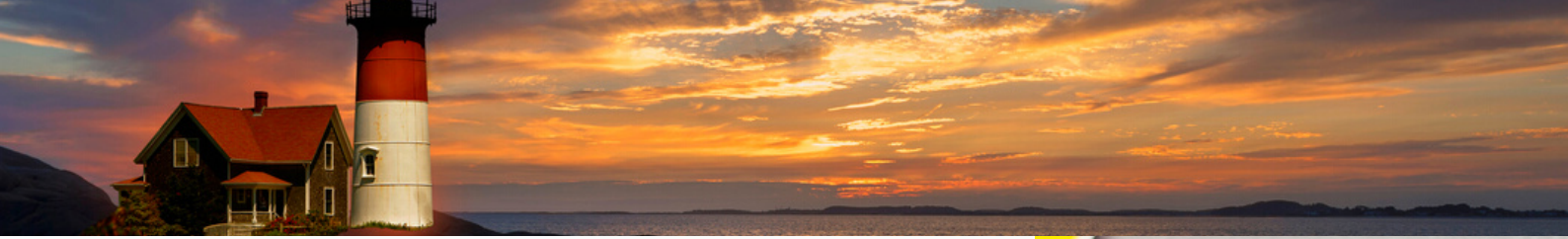

## Immune Boosting Plant-based Recipes

### SUPER-GREEN VEGAN KALE PESTO

Easy vegan pesto with tons of fresh herbs, nutrient-rich kale, seeds, and nutritional yeast! The perfect 10-minute spread or sauce for Italian night and beyond! Vegan, gluten-free, and oil-free optional.

#### Ingredients

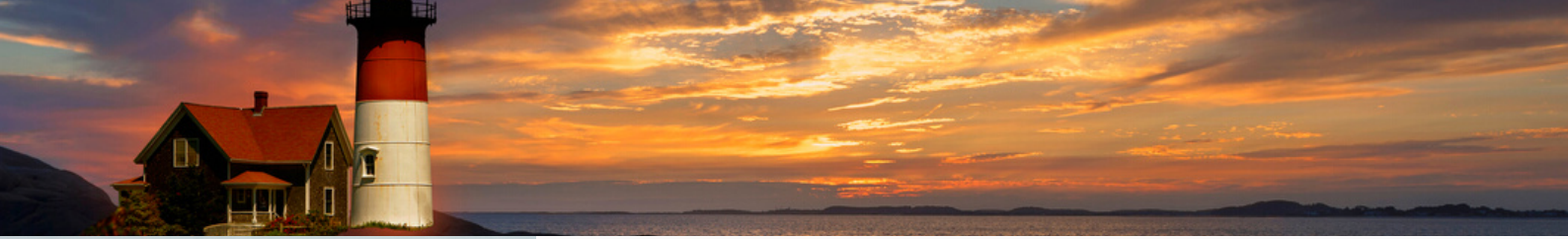
- 1 cup packed fresh basil (large stems removed)
- 1 cup packed fresh parsley (large stems removed)
- 2 cups packed kale (or other sturdy green such as collards or beet greens)
- 3 Tbsp sunflower seeds, hemp seeds, or brazil nuts (use seeds to keep nut-free)
- 3 large cloves garlic (peeled)
- 1-2 Tbsp lemon juice
- 3-4 Tbsp nutritional yeast
- 1/4 tsp sea salt (plus more to taste)
- 2-3 Tbsp extra virgin olive oil (if avoiding oil, sub water)
- 3-6 Tbsp water (plus more as needed)

#### Instructions

1. To a food processor or small blender, add the basil, parsley, kale, nuts/seeds, garlic, lemon juice, nutritional yeast, and sea salt and blend/mix on high until a loose paste forms.
2. Add olive oil (or water) a little at a time (streaming in while the machine is on if possible) and scrape down sides as needed. Then add 1 Tbsp water at a time until the desired consistency is reached - a thick but pourable sauce.
3. Taste and adjust flavor as needed, adding more nutritional yeast for cheesy flavor, salt for overall flavor, seeds for “nuttiness” or thickness, garlic for bite/zing, or lemon juice for acidity.
4. Store covered in the refrigerator up to 5 days. After that, pour into ice cube molds, freeze, and store in the freezer up to 1 month or more.

## ROMESCO SOUP WITH SMASHED CHICKPEAS

Delicious vegan soup inspired by romesco sauce with red peppers, tomatoes, vegetable broth, and almonds. A 10-ingredient plant-based side or entrée!

### Ingredients

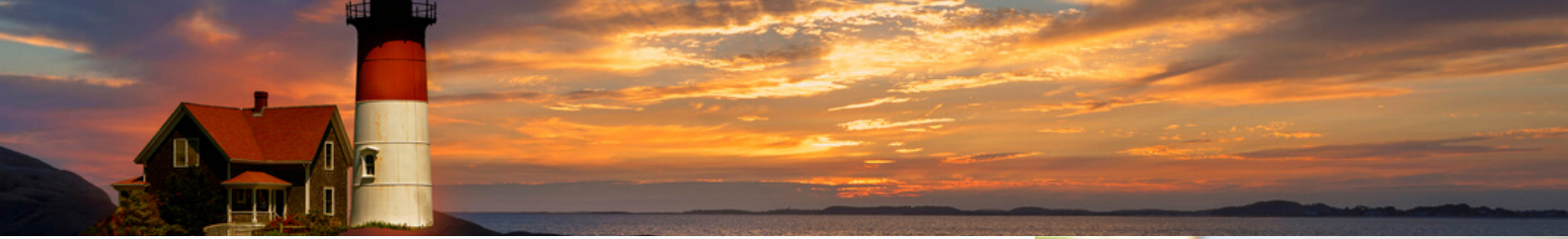
- 2 large red bell peppers (skin and stems on)
- 1 cup raw almonds
- 4 cloves garlic (skin on)
- 1 28-ounce can diced tomatoes (slightly drained)
- 4 cups vegetable broth (DIY or store-bought)
- 1 1/2 Tbsp red wine vinegar (sub apple cider vinegar)
- 3/4 tsp smoked paprika (plus more to taste)
- 1/2 tsp each sea salt and black pepper
- 1 Tbsp maple syrup or coconut sugar (or stevia, just a dash)
- 1-2 tsp harissa paste (optional, or 1/4 tsp red pepper flake)
- 1 15-ounce can chickpeas (rinsed, drained, smashed with a fork)

### Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 350°F and arrange red peppers, still whole with stems, on one end of a clean baking sheet. On the other end, arrange almonds and garlic (still in skin). If making a larger batch, use more baking sheets, if needed.
2. Place baking sheet in oven and roast almonds for 10-12 minutes or until slightly cracked and golden brown. Then remove almonds from pan and set aside. Continue baking garlic for another 5-8 minutes. Then remove and set aside.
3. With peppers still on baking sheet, increase heat to 475°F. Allow red peppers to roast until skin is bubbled and mostly blackened, turning/flipping halfway through to char both sides (~10 minutes).
4. Once they're properly charred, wrap roasted red peppers in foil and steam for 2-3 minutes. Then peel away skin, seeds, and core. Also remove skin from roasted garlic.
5. Add peeled peppers, almonds, garlic, diced tomatoes, vinegar, paprika, sea salt, pepper, maple syrup or coconut sugar, and (optional) harissa or pepper flake to a high-speed blender. Purée until smooth, scraping down sides as needed. Taste and adjust seasonings as desired, adding more harissa or pepper flake for heat, salt for saltiness, vinegar for acidity, maple syrup or coconut sugar for sweetness, or paprika for smokiness.
6. Add the soup to a large pot and add the vegetable broth and smashed chickpeas. Bring to a simmer over medium heat. Then reduce heat to low and continue simmering for 10-15 minutes, stirring occasionally.
7. Serve as is or with a bit of pine nuts, fresh herbs, vegan parmesan cheese, or your favorite bread or roll.
8. Leftovers keep well covered in the refrigerator for 3-4 days, though best when fresh.

## ROASTED BROCCOLI SWEET POTATO CHICKPEA SALAD

A satisfying, plant-rich entrée or side with roasted broccoli, sweet potato, and chickpeas. Topped with a creamy 4-ingredient garlic dill sauce.

### Ingredients

#### VEGETABLES

- 1 large sweet potatoes (or sub two small)
- 1 medium head broccoli (torn, chopped into bite size pieces)
- 2 Tbsp olive, grape seed or melted coconut oil
- 1 healthy pinch each salt and black pepper
- 1 tsp dried dill (optional, or sub 2 tsp fresh dill)
- 1 medium red bell pepper (thinly sliced, leave raw or roast with broccoli)

#### CHICKPEAS

- 1 15-ounce can chickpeas (drained, rinsed, thoroughly dried)
- 1 Tbsp olive or grape seed oil
- 1 Tbsp tandoori masala spice
- 1 tsp coconut sugar
- 1 healthy pinch sea salt

#### GARLIC DILL SAUCE

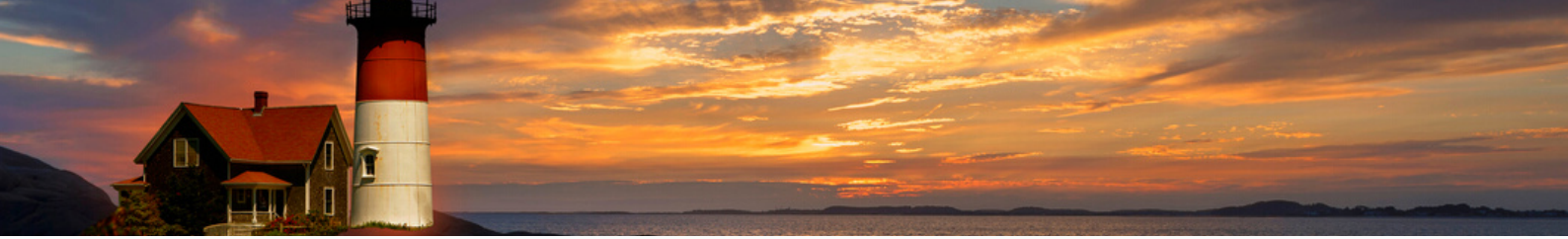
- 1/3 cup hummus (homemade or store-bought)
- 3 large cloves garlic, minced
- 1 tsp dried (or sub 2 tsp fresh dill per 1 tsp dried)
- 2 Tbsp lemon juice
- 1. Water (to thin)



### Instructions

1. Preheat oven to 375°F and line two baking sheets with parchment paper (or grease lightly).
2. In a mixing bowl, toss rinsed dried chickpeas, oil, tandoori spice, coconut sugar and salt.
3. Add sweet potatoes and chickpeas to one sheet, and the broccoli to another. Drizzle the vegetables with olive oil and sprinkle with salt and pepper, toss to combine. Sprinkle with dill (optional). Then arrange in a single layer.
4. Bake both for a total of 20-25 minutes, rotating the pans once at the halfway point. You'll know the broccoli is done when it's golden brown, the sweet potatoes will be tender, and the chickpeas will begin firming up and taking on a slight crunch. Set aside.
5. While vegetables and chickpeas are baking, prepare dressing in a small mixing bowl by whisking hummus, garlic, dill, and lemon juice. Then add only enough water to thin until pourable. Set aside.
6. To serve, divide vegetables and chickpeas between two serving plates and drizzle with dressing, or serve on the side.
7. Best when fresh, though leftovers keep stored separately for 2-3 days in the refrigerator. Enjoy leftovers slightly chilled or at room temperature for best flavor/texture.

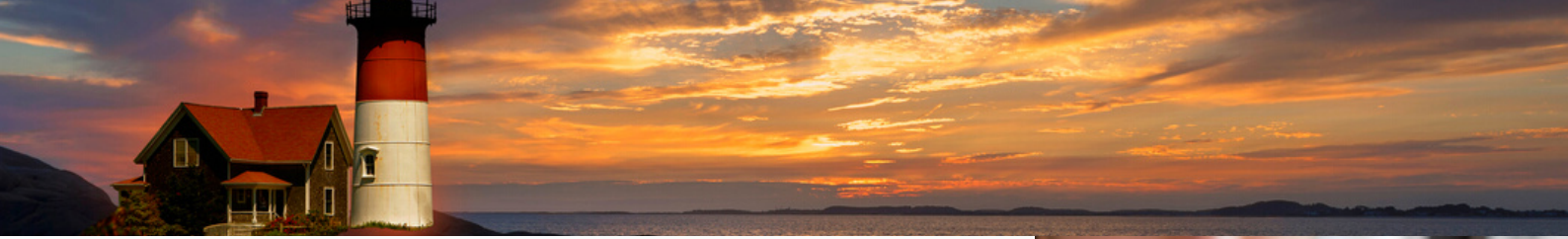

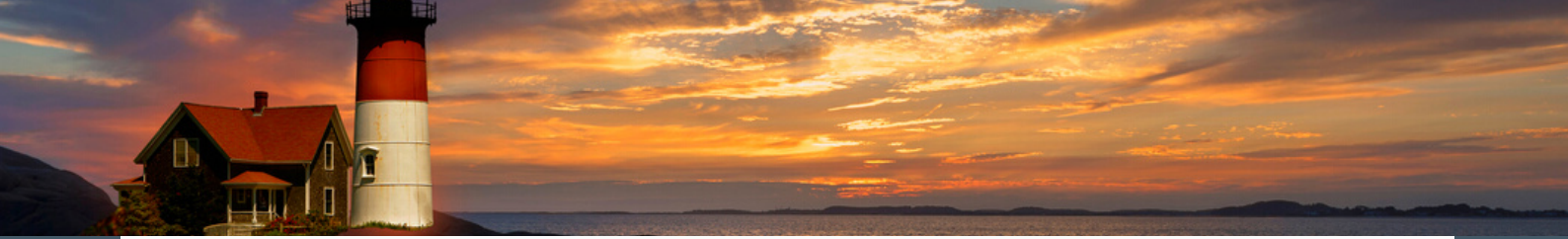

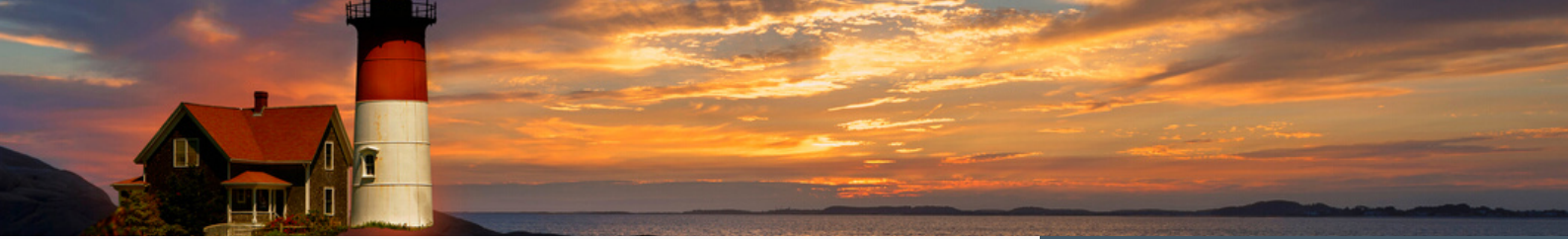
